Dear Bethel,

This time of year, we often think about preparing for Christmas celebrations: putting up certain decorations, baking special foods, sending cards, buying gifts. My mom is insisting on some sort of tree, but I am sure that my normal Christmas decorations won't survive my recalcitrant puppy Paolo. I am going to bring them here and pour myself into preparing the Bethel welcome area.

Spiritually, Advent is a time to prepare ourselves anew to ponder the mysteries of the incarnation, and to prepare for Christ's return. Some years, it feels as easy as stirring together the classic ingredients: a little hope, a generous helping of love, a dash of joy, a sense of peace. Some years, it can feel exhausting even before you begin. Perhaps you have to find yourself trying to prepare in a new setting. Perhaps the hope has been misplaced, the joy is a little stale, or peace is in short supply.

The Advent wreath can help us whether we are celebrating or still searching. Each week as we lift up the themes of hope, love, joy and peace, may it be an invitation to tend a flame or notice a need in your heart, in your home, in our community, or in the world. If you are feeling full, may that awareness center and ground you. If you are feeling low, consider coming to evening prayer on a Wednesday, or the Advent Peace & Healing service (sometimes called a "Blue Christmas" service) December 18 at St. Peter's. Sometimes what you need can be found where two or three are gathered for song and silence. May the Holy Spirit bank your fires and light your searches.

BEFRIENDERS by Marci Groenewold

Have you ever been told "Don't worry, everything will be okay" or "I know how you feel" when experiencing a difficult time? For BeFrienders, these statements are referred to as "platitudes." In actuality, no one really knows how you feel or if everything will be ever okay.

The Women of the ELCA publish the Gather magazine as a resource for women's Bible studies and timely articles. In her recent "Receiving Grace" series, author Heidi Haverkamp offers insight into what she refers to as "toxic positivity." Here are some key points: Living and walking in the light of Christ does not mean the same thing as being happy or positive all the time. It is a Christian practice to acknowledge that life is hard and difficult sometimes. Healing requires, honesty, as well as allowing painful emotions to be heard. While toxic positivity says, "Look on the bright side!" or "Everything happens for a reason, God has a plan" or "Don't be so negative," the Light of Christ says, "With the help and love of God and other people, we can do hard things" and "What you are feeling is worth listening to. Just as Jesus listened to the people he met, Jesus listens to you too."

There is no need to feel responsible **FOR** another's feelings by fixing, protecting, rescuing or controlling someone else's feelings.

By being responsible **TO** another you can show empathy, listen, encourage, confront and share. You can expect the person to be responsible for themselves and their own actions. You can trust and let go.





Total \$ 10,635	\$ (22,928)

Great news for October revenue! Income received exceeded the monthly goal by \$36K. This allowed us to cover October expenses plus reduce the deficit by \$10,635. Thank you.

Budgeted annual revenue of \$969K less Oct. 31 YTD actual income of \$777K equals \$192K needed to meet budget or \$96K for each of Nov. and Dec. As you are reading this, we are awaiting the results of November. I hope you are as excited as I am to see where we are at. We will let you know the amount needed during December to meet our annual expenses and end the year in a positive balance. Thank you for your commitment to Bethel.


