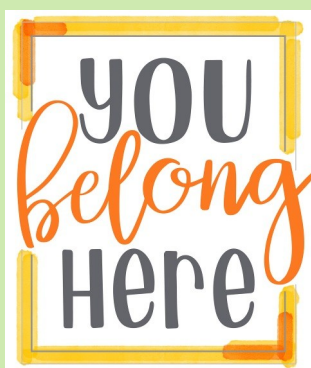

SEEING GOD'S STORY IN NEW WAYS

Bethel commissioned Sicangu Lakota artist John Sterner to create a wood relief wall hanging that will help us continue to engage and move beyond our land acknowledgement statement. Sterner named the piece "Aikoyaka," a Lakota word for "connection" that refers to our interconnection with nature, with people both past and present, and most importantly, our connection with God.

“Unprecedented.” It’s a word we’ve been hearing a lot more of in recent years.

“An unprecedented pandemic. An unprecedented insurrection. An unprecedented election.”

We have been, are, and will continue living in “unprecedented” times.

There are days, many days, I find myself feeling so over the “unprecedented.” Can I just get some more “precedented,” please? I long for a context that is less triggering, divisive, and draining, but I can feel powerless to actually do something that would make a difference.

I feel like Frodo, the Hobbit, in the Lord of the Rings series when he grieves the challenging circumstances he finds himself in, weighed down by responsibility, fear, and uncertainty.

“I wish it need not have happened in my time.” (Geeky Pastor Alert) And then I remember the wizard, Gandalf’s wise response: “So do I, and so do all who live to see such times. But that is not for them to decide. All we have to decide is what to do with the time that is given us.”

And this enheartening wisdom from this fantasy story reminds me of another from Esther’s story in scripture. Esther is made queen in a time when her people are facing great peril (another “unprecedented” time), but she is overwhelmed, afraid, and uncertain of what she can and should do. And her cousin Mordecai responds to her uncertainty, “Who knows? Perhaps you have come to royal dignity for just such a time as this.”

In this “unprecedented” time, of election, division, and uncertainty, perhaps you have been called to “such a time as this.” In fact, I know you have. Not because you have been well equipped for it or that it has been, is, or will be easy. But because you have been called by a God that is constantly at work in the “unprecedented” bringing new life and hope out of death and the seemingly hopeless in Jesus Christ.

BeFRIENDERS

For over 25 years, the BeFriender Ministry Coordinator Team has trained dozens of Bethelites to become BeFriender ministers—a “formal extension of the pastoral ministry of Bethel Lutheran Church.” BeFrienders choose to use their skills in a way that works best for them. They regularly visit members, send cards and write notes of encouragement to various members. When a parishioner would like additional support, they are confidentially paired with a BeFriender. Each pair works out the exact form the relationship takes, determining their own schedules and visits.

The impact of this program goes far beyond supporting individuals and the pastors in their work. BeFriender listening skills strengthen relationships among our families, coworkers, and friends. In our community, a BeFriender minister’s intentional support of Northfield’s TORCH (Tackling Obstacles, Raising College Hope) program allows fellow Bethelites opportunities to provide care packages filled with encouraging gifts to 10 of 613 students who otherwise might never finish high school. In 2023, 100% of TORCH seniors graduated on time. At the state level, one BeFriender minister joins “Moms Demand Action for Gun Sense” at the capitol to advocate for an end to gun violence. Might you have a heart for this ministry too?

BeFriender training will be offered for 8 consecutive weeks beginning February 6, 2025.

Classes will be held in the lower level of the rectory at St Dominic from 6:30-8:30 pm.

IN THE LIBRARY...

A Full Life: Reflections on Ninety

In his major *New York Times* bestseller, Jimmy Carter looks back from ninety years of age and “reveals private thoughts and recollections over a fascinating career as businessman, politician, evangelist, and humanitarian” (Booklist).

At ninety, Jimmy Carter reflects on his public and private life with a frankness that is disarming. He adds detail and emotion about his youth in rural Georgia that he described in his magnificent *An Hour Before Daylight*. He writes about racism and the isolation of the Carters. He describes the brutality of the hazing regimen at Annapolis, and how he nearly lost his life twice serving on submarines and his amazing interview with Admiral Rickover. He describes the profound influence his mother had on him, and how he admired his father even though he didn't emulate him. He admits that he decided to quit the Navy and later enter politics without consulting his wife, Rosalynn, and how appalled he is in retrospect.

In his “warm and detailed memoir” (Los Angeles Times), Carter tells what he is proud of and what he might do differently. He discusses his regret at losing his re-election, but how he and Rosalynn pushed on and made a new life and second and third rewarding careers. He is frank about the presidents who have succeeded him, world leaders, and his passions for the causes he cares most about, particularly the condition of women and the deprived people of the developing world.



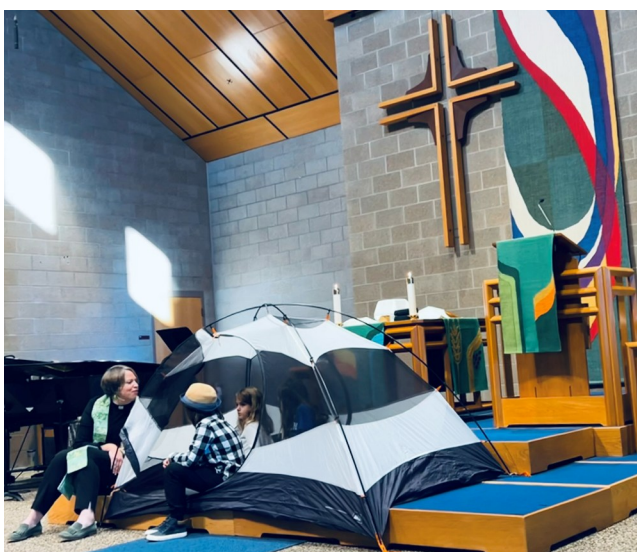

October means Pet Blessings To Go and Confirmation joy.



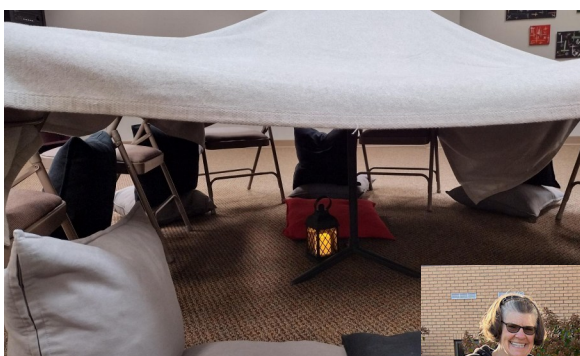
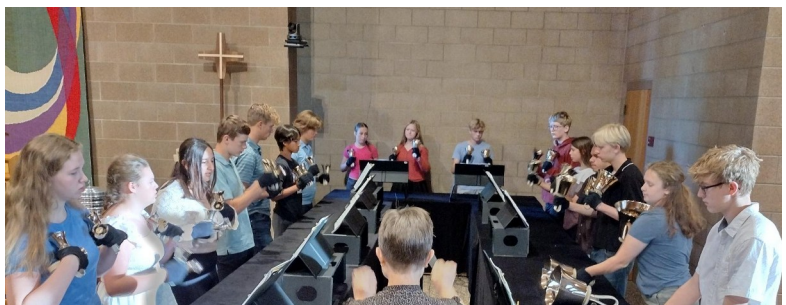
Worship highlights included bell choir performances and a tent in the sanctuary to highlight God's response to King David wanting to build God a temple and how God "camps" among us.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE WITH TORCH



TORCH stands for Tackling Obstacles and Raising College Hopes. The mission of TORCH is to support and empower students in graduating from high school and pursuing future goals, with an intentional focus on partnering with Northfield's students of color, youth from low income families, and first-generation college attendees.

This year's fall care packages (including homemade cookies, school supplies, cash, and more!) went to six students that are studying through Riverland College here in Northfield with the Community College Collaborative. They take classes both in person and online, from Earth Science to Ethics to English! We also delivered a box to St. Olaf for the first time in a few years, and mailed packages to Michigan, Minneapolis and Rochester. Most of the students are either first or second year students. One student is in their 4th year and another will graduate in January after a semester abroad this fall! Although the pandemic was very difficult for our TORCH college students, more are returning to classes these past couple of years. Donations to the Bethel TORCH fund are appreciated—it is helpful to have money in the account so that when it is time to do the mailings the cash for students can be requested and the postage is covered. This year this ministry costs about \$700—when more is received, it is carried forward for future years. Thank you to everyone who has been supporting TORCH students! As of September 30, our operating budget deficit has risen to \$33,564. As you are reading this, we are compiling the results from October. They will be included in the financial snapshot in your weekly bulletin when they are available.

At this writing, we know we will need to cover expenses from October through December plus this deficit for an estimated total of \$275K or \$92K per month. Last year our offerings averaged \$103K per month for these three months and in 2022 the average was \$93K. So, historical giving shows that we have the capacity and the will to meet our giving needs.
