FROM OUR SENIOR PASTOR AND CONGREGATIONAL PRESIDENT...

Dear Partners,

When is Bethel going to open up?

It's a question we have heard often. When will we resume normal activity and be together again?

We understand the question. Most of us thrive in our Christian discipleship when we can be encouraged and supported by our fellow Bethelites. We are missing our ministry and the fellowship that comes when it is safe to gather. We know we are better together.

So why not just open up?

We've all heard the phrase: out of an abundance of caution. In order to open, we need to be able to safely and effectively manage the density, duration, and social distance of our members as well as endeavor to provide as safe an environment as possible in areas such as hygiene and air quality. To that end, we are taking our cues from the Centers for Disease Control,

MN Department of Health, and the Northfield Public School District. As you know, out of an abundance of caution, the District decided to open in a hybrid leaning system (part in-person instruction and part Zoom-based instruction) for the middle and high schools and even offered an all Zoom-based learning option for families who were reluctant to gather together.

Because Covid-19 is a dangerous and potentially deadly disease, we, along with our Church Council partners and the Bethel staff, chose to offer our worship, Sunday School, Bethel U, Wednesday programming, and other activities virtually. Additionally, Soup for the Soul clubs, walking and adventurer groups have formed to safely foster connection. We welcome your ideas on how to continue to connect during this difficult season. We are all looking forward to resuming the varied and important ministries and activities that Bethel offers.

So, when are we going to reopen?

You've been following the numbers just like we have. Covid-19 cases are up. Hospitalizations and deaths from Covid are up. Perhaps even more wearisome is the fact that the CDC is sounding the alarm about a potential "twindemic" as the flu season begins. (Please, get a flu shot.) Far from out of the woods, our country is in the thick of it and potentially moving into further difficult times this winter.

Is this the time to reopen? While some will say "Yes," we, out of an abundance of caution, will take a wait-and-see approach. Right now, we choose to be safe rather than sorry. That's what we think. What do you think? Please let us know your thoughts.

FINANCIAL NOTES

We continue to have incredible support from our members, resulting in another great month. We are so thankful to all of you!

Net Income: Sept: \$7k net income vs. \$20k net loss budgeted. We do not have our typical programming start-up expenses, nor transportation costs from youth summer trips.

Revenue: Sept: \$63k actual vs. \$67k budgeted. This is the second consecutive time since March that revenue has been under budget. Facility rental and other income are down 65% to budget.

Expense: Sept: \$57k actual vs. \$88k budgeted. YTD expenses are \$552k vs. \$707k budgeted. Personnel is 19% below budget as we do not have a co-senior Pastor and have two unfilled staff vacancies. Programming expenses are less than half of what was budgeted. Facilities expenses are significantly underrunning due to lower utility expenses, custodial supplies, and maintenance.

Mortgage balance: \$68,546 (I have to say it again: incredible!)

Endowment Fund balance: \$14,137

The way we talk about people matters. Names matter. Renaming a day matters. Recognizing the original people who have been here for time immemorial matters. Indigenous Peoples Day

matters. We join states, cities and towns across the country to celebrate Indigenous Peoples Day in place of Columbus Day and honor the people whose lands we walk, whose Indigenous voices have always been spoken here and who share their gifts and contributions throughout our society.

...We must continue to do this, repudiating racism, white supremacy, and logos, mascots and stereotypes that perpetuate prejudice against Native Americans. We must learn and tell the

stories. We must educate ourselves and everyone within the sound of our voices about all the corners of our country’s dark and shameful past. We must build and strengthen relationships anew. Today and every day we commit to do our part to understand, respect and celebrate American Indian and Alaska Native people, their congregations and communities, and the church.
